

This setting of the familiar Palm Sunday chorale (to the tune called St. Theodulph at UMH #280) was written around 1903. It is a chorale prelude, meaning that the hymn is heard once in its entirety. However, Reger uses the different registers of the organ to repeat the ends of the phrases, almost like distant echoes one might hear in a cavernous church. The melody was first published in 1614 by Melchior Teschner.

When they had come near Jerusalem and had reached Bethphage, at the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two disciples, ² saying to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately you will find a donkey tied, and a colt with her; untie them and bring them to me. ³ If anyone says anything to you, just say this, 'The Lord needs them.' And he will send them immediately." ⁴ This took place to fulfill what had been spoken through the prophet, saying, ⁵ "Tell the daughter of Zion, Look, your king is coming to you, humble, and mounted on a donkey, and on a colt, the foal of a donkey." ⁶ The disciples went and did as Jesus had directed them; ⁷ they brought the donkey and the colt, and put their cloaks on them, and he sat on them. ⁸ A very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, and others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. ⁹ The crowds that went ahead of him and that followed were shouting, "Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest heaven!" ¹⁰ When he entered Jerusalem, the whole city was in turmoil, asking, "Who is this?" ¹¹ The crowds were saying, "This is the prophet Jesus from Nazareth in Galilee."



Prayer of Confession & Words of Assurance

One: Lord Jesus Christ, we praise you with heart and life and voice, not only with outward signs such as palm branches or the occasional "Hosanna," but with lives truly turned towards you. It seems such a distance from this present day, Palm Sunday, to that day when you entered Jerusalem with the shouts of the crowd ringing in your ears. Welcomed as a king, yet riding on a lowly donkey. Greeted with cheers and acclamations which were so soon to turn to jeers and condemnation. From this side of the resurrection, we confidently believe that we could never have been part of the jeering crowd—but would we, if we had been there?

(Silent Reflection)

One: Lord Jesus Christ, when our words and actions reflect a reluctance to confess you publicly as Lord of our lives:

ALL: Forgive us.

- One: When we fear that humility will be seen as weakness or a defect in our character:
- ALL: Forgive us.
- One: When we have betrayed your love for us through our lack of love for you, for others, and for ourselves:
- ALL: Forgive us.
- One: When we find ourselves glossing over the events of your passion and death because we look forward to Easter as a time to enjoy holidays.
- ALL: Forgive us.
- One: Lord Jesus, fix your mind in us; remake us in your image; empty us of all that keeps us from following you to places of pain, suffering, exploitation, and injustice.

ALL: Gracious and loving God, empower us with the Holy Spirit so that our lives continually glorify you and we proclaim Jesus as Lord. This we pray in Jesus' name. Amen.

- One: Hear the good news: "Jesus, though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave ... and became obedient to the point of death—even death on a cross." Through his obedience we are therefore freed from whatever sin enslaves us.
- ALL: Thanks be to God!

ALL: Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; Thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, forever. Amen.

The lyricist of the original hymn text, Valerius Herberger, was a clergyman in Poland, where there was an outbreak of the plague in 1613. A large proportion of the population fell victim to the illness, but Herberger remained and was often the only person, along with the gravedigger, who interred the corpses. This grief-stricken but hopeful text is perfect for Palm Sunday, when we celebrate the pomp of Christ entering Jerusalem, while being mindful of the dark events set to transpire at the end of the week. Bach's music seems cheerful, perhaps as a sign of positive thinking and the power of conviction in one's faith, rather than desperation in the face of adversity. The pedal plays the theme in strong tones underneath figuration and counterpoint in the hands.
